

Kindergarten News:

September was a busy month in Kindergarten. We have been working so hard at learning to write our alphabet-both capital and lower case-the "Handwriting Without Tears" way. We have made it through the capital letters!! We would appreciate it if you would reinforce this way of writing with your child at home... especially when they write their name (there is a sample alphabet in the back of their "Kindergarten Daily Folder"). Up to this point, all we cared about was that they COULD write their name where we recognize it. Now we will begin looking for them to write their first name using correct letter formation (STARTING AT THE TOP!) and with a capital at the beginning and the rest lower case letters.

In language arts, we have been doing lots of reading and writing. We have been working hard during writing workshop time and each child has written several stories that they are excited for you to see soon. They are doing such a great job of sounding out words and using their best guesses for spelling. Please continue to practice those sight words-they should be able to instantly recognize AND spell them.

We hope you're enjoying our latest class book- the "I Can I Can Book". Thanks for your encouraging comments-the students really enjoy hearing them. Be watching for "The Leaf Book" to be coming home soon! ©

The students are SO engaged in their math learning! Hopefully they have shared with you some of the activities we have been doing in class. You can ask them about the shape pattern on the calendar, counting the days in school, "5 frames" and "10 frames", collecting objects, making patterns with Unifix Cubes, Pattern Block designs, counting pennies, Geoboards, Polydrons, "Spill the Beans", "Beat You to Five" game, and what greater than and less than mean. At this point, your child should be able to count orally to 30, write their numbers 1-10, begin to make combinations to five (1+4, 2 +3, etc), as well as identify and draw a circle, square, rectangle and triangle and describe how they know it is that shape. We move a mile a minute, but we are learning a ton and having fun while we do it!

In Social Studies, we have had discussions about location, rules and responsibility using our Scholastic News Social Studies Weekly. We also learned about the U.S. Constitution on Constitution Day. We even made our own Kindie Constitution and Portraits to display. Check it out in the Kindie hallway if you are in the building!

Thank you for continuing to read to/with your child for 15 minutes each night and also for helping them complete and return their homework each week! Don't forget to have them read on RAZ-Kids for at least 15 minutes a week!

First Grade News:

We have certainly come a long way since the beginning of the school year with regard to our sense of responsibility. The children are now becoming quite proficient and self-reliant when it comes to the routines and responsibilities of first grade. Good for them!

Our focus in October will be building sight vocabulary, along with continuing the practice of "tricky word" strategies. We have worked hard on short vowel sounds and consonant blends such as ch, sh, ng, qu, and th. Focusing on the idea that "reading is thinking" is very important to first graders. We are working so hard on figuring out all those sounds and words and sometimes forget the most important part of reading is putting thoughts in our heads. Rereading for fluency certainly helps. Doing short summaries or retells after reading at home is a great way to improve comprehension skills.

Our program is just around the corner! Please mark your calendar for November 17th @ 6:30 pm. Looking forward to seeing you there!

As the fall weather turns to winter, please remind your first grader to wear clothing suitable for the varied weather patterns. Please label your child's belongings. We don't like to have to send down piles of unclaimed and unlabeled items to lost and found.

Second Grade News:

Hello Second Grade Families,

We have been having an awesome time in 2nd grade! It was so much fun to see so many of you at the Cottonwood Carnival last week. Thank you to everyone who brought in non-perishable items for our food drive. Thank you to everyone who has sent in money and permission slips for our field trip to The Wings Over the Rockies Museum. Ms. Morris' and Ms. Feeley's classes will be going on the field trip on Monday, October 10th. Since we only have 2 classes traveling on the bus on the 10th, we have room for parent chaperones to ride the bus with the students. Mrs. Buell's, Mrs. Howard's and Mrs. Wehrle's classes will be traveling to the museum on Tuesday, October 11th. Since 3 classes will be on the bus, we do not have room for parent chaperones to join the students. Teachers will ride the bus with our classes and parent chaperones will need to meet us at the museum. The bus will depart Cottonwood at 9:15 on both days and will return to Cottonwood around 1:00. We will be back at school in time to have lunch in our cafeteria. Your child's teacher will be in touch with the parent chaperones who will be joining us. Each teacher is allowed to bring 6 chaperones. We are so lucky to always have an abundance of parents who are able to volunteer. With this comes the fact that we have to turn some parents down. We pick using the good old "pull from a hat" method. If you are not chosen this time, we will find a way to have you involved and participating with your child's class in the future. Thank you for being so awesome and supportive!

We have finished up Unit 1 in Bridges Math and have started on Unit 2. The focus of Unit 2 is on Place Value and Measurement. Students will identify the place and value of a 3-digit number. They will read, write, model, and compare 2- and 3-digit numbers. Students will measure and compare lengths of objects. They will model problem-solving strategies on a number line and practice math strategies to add and subtract fluently.

We will finish up our Air and Weather science unit by fall break and start a social studies unit on local and national communities. We are well into our reading and writing workshop hours. In writing we are focusing on how to choose topics to plan for personal narrative stories. Students are learning to organize their thoughts in a plan, write a first draft, and revise and edit their stories. We have finished our first unit in our Spelling By Pattern books and are moving onto Unit 2. Ms. Feeley's class continues to learn spelling using Words Their Way.

The fall weather is looming. Please send your child with appropriate clothing and layers. Our morning outdoor snack break is always a bit chillier than our afternoon lunch recess.

As always, please let us know if you have any questions regarding your child or general 2nd grade information. Thank you for sharing your wonderful kids with us!



Third Grade News:

Third graders have enjoyed learning about our wonderful city! We have been studying historic and contemporary Denver, its' famous people, landmarks, and buildings. We will be able to transfer this learning to the commonalities of cities in our country and around the world. The study of Denver will lead us into the study of the five regions of the United States this school year. The first region we will study covers the Northeast part of our United States. Practice in map reading skills is currently a social studies focus as well.

We are in the process of working in Unit Two of the Bridges in Mathematics program. This unit introduces multiplication by immersing students in a wide variety of multiplicative situations. Students are invited to think of the operation in different ways using a variety of models for multiplication – equal groups, arrays, the number line, and ratio tables. Reliable and efficient strategies are emphasized. The continued use of solving story problems with multiple steps and operations will remain as in the previous addition and subtraction unit.

In the very near future, we will begin a study of matter using the FOSS Science kits. Our objective is to explore soil and weathering, landforms, rocks and minerals, and natural resources.

During the Writer's Workshop, we have been using a notebook as a special place to record our many thoughts, ideas, observations, etc. As we write informational text, we are emphasizing careful proofreading and spelling as well as focusing on supporting ideas with details and examples.

Thank you for your continued support and cooperation as we work with your very fine third grade students.



Fourth Grade News:

It is hard to believe it is almost October! We have been already been reading so much this year! During our reading workshop, we have been learning about metacognition, schema, and making connections. We are then taking those skills and using them in our choice reading. We have been busy conferring and recommending books to others and being life-long readers!

In writing, we have been busy drafting our personal essays by adding examples, lists, and mini-stories. The kids have been learning all about how to enhance their reasons by giving good examples and proof. We are excited to be able to share them when they are finished!

Our science time has been revolving around space. We have learned about shadows, the direction the Earth rotates, the moon phases, and how big the sun, moon, and Earth actually are. The kids have enjoyed learning about the solar system and how our seasons and night and day all work! Next, we will be going back to social studies and begin our study of Colorado history.

In math, we have been learning and sharing our multiplication strategies for larger numbers. The kids have been doing a great job with trying new strategies and finding patterns in those strategies. We are proud of the learning and perseverance they have been showing!

Throughout our day, we have been continuing to talk about mindset and how we can use our thoughts to create positivity and growth. This is something we will continue to talk about all year!

We feel so fortunate to have so much support from our wonderful parents! Thank you!

Dear Parents,

It is hard to believe that we are in school for almost six weeks now. We are off to a great start. Students are enjoying the rotations for different classes. Mrs. Litschewski is working on European Explorers, and Mr. Waller is working on Geography and Native Americans in social studies. Mrs. Derbish and Mrs. Singh are working on Systems in Living unit. Students are excited to learn about circulatory system, respiratory system, and digestive system. We also enjoyed the life cycle of butterflies and red worms habitat.

The character must be from a book they have read recently (not just from a movie or cartoon they have watched), and your child should be prepared to describe both the character and the book. Your student must <u>bring the book on the day of the celebration</u>. While we understand that some characters in books are traditionally seen with certain props, costumes cannot include masks, weapons, or inappropriate language or content. As on any other day at Cottonwood Creek, Storybook Character attire must meet dress code expectations.

It would be good to discuss with your child different characters from their favorite books. The dressing up possibilities are endless:





SHAPING A CHILD'S IDENTITY



PARENTS CAN INFLUENCE HOW KIDS SEE THEMSELVES

"Can you imagine your child wishing they were someone else?" asked Diana Thompson at PIN's kick-off meeting in September. For any parent who loves their child, that's a painful thought to consider, but one that gets at the heart of a child's struggles with identity and how they see themselves.

Thompson's presentation focused on actions parents can take to move a child with a negative self image to one who is confident and increasingly empowered over time.

Her approach builds on every child's capacity to be a hero (a problem solver), leader (a guide or inspiration to



ro (a problem solver), leader (a guide or inspiration to others), and champion (an overcomer of obstacles). In her talk, Thompson explained:

 Parents can help reframe personality liabilities as assets and tap into the hidden strengths of their child.

 The importance of replacing negative self-talk ("griptonite") with positive messages that encourage and empower ("scriptonite").

 The ability of emotions to move a child toward or away from their potential.
Emotions are not facts, but need to be diffused and understood before the underlying problem can be solved.
